HOLOCAUST SURVIVOR PROGRAM

We hold sacred the promise that we made in 1936 – to remain the last surviving relative for survivors of the Holocaust. With approximately 45,000 survivors living in New York, and 50% living at or below the federal poverty line, the needs of this population grow more intense every year. However, our commitment has never been stronger. We are honored to have touched the lives of 4,300 survivors last year through personalized case management, home care, and opportunities for dancing, socializing, and more.

With support from the Jewish Federations of North America through the National Holocaust Survivor Initiative, Selfhelp is embarking on an outreach program to identify and serve additional survivors of the Holocaust as well as train our community partners to identify survivors and connect them to resources.

SHANGHAI EVENT

On June 6th, Selfhelp hosted a gathering of Chinese residents of Shanghai during World War II and Jewish refugees who lived in the Shanghai Ghetto. Dvir Bar-Gal, a leading expert on the history of the Shanghai Ghetto, spoke of the history of Shanghai during World War II.

This event celebrated the connection between Selfhelp's past and present – the Holocaust survivors who are our historic constituency and the reason we were founded back in 1936, along with the Chinesespeaking community we so proudly serve today in Flushing and throughout New York. Though there were differences in language and culture, the two communities suffered side by side. They were, and continue to be, linked by a shared experience. The event gave voice to both communities to share their stories of adversity, strength, resilience, and survival.



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GETTING CONNECTED THROUGH LIFELONG LEARNING

VIRTUAL SENIOR CENTER (VSC)

In creating an online community of seniors with limited mobility, the Virtual Senior Center serves as both a lifeline and an opportunity for participants to learn, share their passions, and have fun.

On top of the personal relationships, the program serves as a link to the digital world. Participants gain comfort with technology, utilizing the computer to join classes, email, Skype with their family, read the news, browse the web, play games, and more.

WHAT'S NEXT FOR THE VSC?

We're excited about the progress we've made in providing engaging and compelling socialization experiences for the participants, and we look ahead to our next steps. We are currently working with partners to establish the VSC as a tool to manage chronic conditions and to deliver geriatric mental health counseling.



Staying Well at Home

In a pilot program with 903 clients, Selfhelp tested a care transitions program to improve health outcomes for individuals transferring from the hospital to another setting, such as their home. In addition to assisting individuals leaving the hospital, our staff referred clients to

social and legal services, substance abuse treatment, transportation, immigration services, mental health services, durable medical equipment, pharmacies to get prescriptions filled, legal services, senior centers, home delivered meals, and home care.

SENIOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING, NATURALLY OCCURRING RETIREMENT COMMUNITIES (NORCS), AND REAL ESTATE DEVELOPMENT



"Being independent means being able to explore the neighborhood where I grew up."

In order to meet the needs of older New Yorkers who want to age in the communities they call home, Selfhelp is building more senior housing throughout New York City and Long Island.

In February, we officially opened Van Cortlandt Green, our first residence in the Bronx, providing high-quality housing to 85 low-income older adults.

Construction is underway at **333 Lenox Road** in the East Flatbush section of Brooklyn.

This new residence is scheduled to open in spring of 2018. Selfhelp is among the first affordable housing providers to receive funding through the State's Empire State Supportive Housing Initiative for this project.

Selfhelp was part of a coalition of affordable housing stakeholders that successfully advocated for New York State to include \$125 million in the final budget to fund the construction of new senior affordable housing throughout the State.

Residents in Selfhelp's Housing are Healthier

Selfhelp believes that the best outcomes for older adults are achieved when social services support client health. Our research work proves this, too. Together with our partners, we continue to conduct research to enable more people to age in the way they want to - in their homes and communities, engaged, and healthy.

With the generous support of JPMorgan Chase, Selfhelp conducted a study of the residents in our senior affordable housing program. Comparing Medicaid data for residents in our housing to other seniors living in the same zip codes over two years, we found:



Lower odds of a Selfhelp resident visiting an emergency room compared to a non-Selfhelp resident We know that housing plus services, if and when requested, is the right model. Now we want to expand it, and offer more housing options that best meets the needs of older adults. Selfhelp will continue to work with our partners and policymakers to make more senior housing options available.

To better understand how the model achieves these outcomes, we are conducting further research as one of 20 organizations selected to participate in the Health Outcomes Demonstration Project, a joint effort by NeighborWorks America (Neighborhood Reinvestment Corporation) and Enterprise Community Partners.



COMMUNITY GUARDIAN PROGRAM

Since 1990, Selfhelp's Community Guardian Programs have served over 1,500 clients, enabling them to live in their homes. Selfhelp currently manages the affairs of clients ages 23 to 103 with severe health and mental health conditions, those facing evictions, and other vulnerable individuals.

Meet **Yajaira Brown**, a case worker in our NYC Community Guardian Program:



"My role as case worker is to advocate for clients to stay in their homes. The majority of the clients we serve are facing eviction, financial exploitation by family or friends, or suffering from severe health conditions. When a client is facing eviction, our social workers, accountants, housing specialists,

and lawyers work as a team to keep them in their homes. That changes the client's life because they won't need to go to a shelter."

HER AVERAGE DAY

"No two days are alike, and many days take place in the field. I visit clients in their home, take them to appointments, go to court, and anything else that might come up."

WHY DOES SHE DO THIS WORK?

"I always wanted to help others, and it makes me feel good that I am able to change somebody's life for the better. I want to get up every morning and feel happy that I am going to do something that I enjoy. Helping and giving are the most beautiful gifts that a person can give."

Through our home care programs, we train the next generation of caregivers to fulfill our mission in countless homes throughout New York. In 1936, Selfhelp started training German Jewish refugees to serve as home care workers. Today, we are committed to providing opportunities to those seeking meaningful work as caregivers in our home care program, many of whom are immigrants.

Through our Certified Home Health Agency (CHHA), we are able to serve patients with a physical therapy or nursing need, even if they were not in the hospital or rehab facility.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTIONS

HOLOCAUST SURVIVOR PROGRAM

The oldest and largest program in North America providing comprehensive services to over 4,300 Holocaust survivors, Selfhelp offers a full continuum of care, including enhanced case management, home health care, housekeeping, financial management/guardianship, social programs, emergency financial assistance, and more.

VIRTUAL SENIOR CENTER

Selfhelp's acclaimed Virtual Senior Center offers homebound seniors the opportunity to engage and connect with one another and the outside world through stimulating classes and programs. A cornerstone of the program is the real-time instructor-led classes where participants learn about topics and interact with one another to reduce social isolation.

AFFORDABLE SENIOR HOUSING

Selfhelp's ten affordable apartment buildings offer seniors the opportunity to lead independent lives in a warm and supportive environment. At each building, we offer the Selfhelp Active Services for Aging Model (SHASAM), which makes available social work services, education, and recreation, as well as access to skilled nursing and home care.

HOME HEALTH CARE

A leading provider of home health care in the New York City metropolitan area, Selfhelp delivers over two million hours of home care annually to elderly, frail individuals and families at-risk. Services are designed to maintain independent living and include skilled nursing, assistance with activities of daily living, housekeeping, homemaking and therapeutic care. Selfhelp's highly regarded training program provides high-caliber education and certification to home health aides.

SENIOR CENTERS

Selfhelp's five senior centers, including one of the first to be designated by the City of New York as an Innovative Senior Center, offer a wide variety of lifeenhancing programs such as computer classes, concerts and lectures, health and wellness workshops, as well as nutritious meals for seniors living in the surrounding communities. Three of these senior centers are now key sites for Selfhelp's expanding Virtual Senior Center.

CASE MANAGEMENT

Selfhelp's three comprehensive Case Management programs help seniors through a collaborative process of assessment, planning, facilitation, care coordination, evaluation, and advocacy. Social workers provide expert assistance in accessing entitlements and benefits, as well as financial assistance, home delivered meals and chore services. The goal is to enable vulnerable seniors to continue to live independently in their own homes.

SENIOR SOURCE

For adults seeking a portal of entry for all health and other forms of care, Senior Source provides access to a Care Manager, seven days a week. A fee-for-service geriatric care management program, Senior Source helps clients and their families navigate the maze of health care and residential options, monitor and support ongoing care, and prepare for future care needs.

ALZHEIMER'S PROGRAMS

The Selfhelp Alzheimer's Resource Program (SHARP) provides social adult day care, assessment and referral, together with music therapy and other social activities for individuals in the early to mid-stages of Alzheimer's disease. The program also offers support groups for caregivers.



COMMUNITY GUARDIAN PROGRAM

Selfhelp's Guardianship Programs serve as court-appointed legal guardian for clients referred by Adult Protective Services (APS) in NYC and the Department of Social Services in Nassau County, who are over 18 years of age and unable to manage their financial or domestic affairs.

NATURALLY OCCURRING RETIREMENT COMMUNITIES (NORCS)

Selfhelp NORC programs provide senior residents in four large cooperative housing complexes with the supportive services they need to continue living in their own homes. Selfhelp's on-site services include case management, counseling, health screenings, and social, recreational, and educational programs.

CARE TRANSITIONS

Aimed at reducing the rate of hospital readmissions, our Care Transitions program provides coaching and short term case management to patients at three hospitals in Queens who are identified as being at risk of readmission. Coaching takes place in the hospital, at home and via telephone during the first 30-days post discharge. The goal is to maximize understanding and compliance with discharge plans as well as to improve access to health and social services as needed.

TELEHEALTH AND COGNITIVE SERVICES

Our telehealth and cognitive service systems empower seniors to be proactive in caring for their health. User friendly kiosks allow participants to self-monitor clinical health measurements, whereas computers enable them to monitor cognitive fitness through rigorous yet entertaining mental exercises. If there is a sudden change in health or mental acuity a nurse or staff member will be notified to take appropriate action.

NY CONNECTS

Selfhelp's NY Connects Program in Queens provides individuals, caregivers and professionals with consistent, comprehensive, local-based information and referrals regarding long-term services and supports. Our staff work with callers to assess, plan, coordinate, and evaluate the services required to meet their unique medical, emotional, financial, physical and social needs.
